Election of the Board of Managers, July 30

There are three seats open for election this year on the 11-member Campmeeting Association Board of Managers, each for a three-year term. Margaret Hopkins, a current Manager and the Board's Secretary, has indicated an interest in being nominated for re-election. One Board member, Robin May, is retiring from the Board at the end of 2016 and is not seeking re-election at this time. Thank you, Robin, for your service.

Volunteers are being sought for two seats on the Board of Managers. The bio of the current Board member who is seeking re-election is listed below.

The election will be held at the Annual Meeting of the membership on Saturday, July 30. Nominations may also be made from the floor at the Annual Meeting. New Board members will take office in January 2017.

Margaret currently serves as secretary of the Board of Managers and chair of both the Communications and the Parks & Recreation Committees. She is seeking her second term on the Board. In addition to Campmeeting and Mount Gretna activities, Margaret works as a research project manager at the Penn State College of Medicine in Hershey and as an adjunct instructor for Penn State World Campus. She is a Lancaster County Master Gardener and also a Lancaster County Court Appointed Special Advocate.

Premiere Of Documentary Video On Mt. Gretna's History Set For July

A documentary video being produced for the Mt. Gretna Area Historical Society that chronicles the history of Mt. Gretna will be unveiled at two premieres scheduled for early July.

The inaugural showing of the hour-long documentary, entitled "Mount Gretna, PA - A Perennial Spirit," is scheduled for Friday, July 8 at 7:00 p.m. at the Hall of Philosophy in Mt. Gretna's Chautauqua area.

This will be followed on Sunday, July 10 at 1:00 p.m. with a second premiere showing at the Mt. Gretna Fire Hall on Boulevard Avenue. The Sunday premiere is being sponsored by SWC Wealth Management of Mt. Gretna.

Seating for the two premieres is limited, so advanced registration for the two showings is required. The registration cost is \$5 per person for Mt. Gretna Area Historical Society and/or Stewart Society members and \$10 per person for non-members.

The documentary video traces the history of Mount Gretna from its origins as a pristine forested area identified by industrialist Peter Grubb in the 1760's as an ideal location for launching his iron ore business to its present day status as a tranquil, picturesque area noted for its cottage-lined streets, historic century-old cottages, vibrant arts community and exceptional quality of life.

Among the many topics to be covered in the documentary video will be the Grubb and Coleman family legacies, the Campmeeting area that was established in Mount Gretna in 1892, the Pennsylvania Chautauqua that was also founded in 1892, the National Guard encampment that called Mount Gretna home from 1885 - 1935, Conewago Lake, Mount Gretna's three early historic hotels, the Mount Gretna narrow gauge railroad, Mt. Gretna's historic neighborhoods, Governor Dick Park and present day life in Mount Gretna.

The video is being produced for the Historical Society by James Forney of Forney Video Productions based in Sewickley, PA. Michael Bachleda and his firm, Bachleda Advertising, of Schaefferstown provided creative and graphic design services for the documentary DVD and the DVD cover.

Copies of the documentary DVD are available for ordering through the Mt. Gretna Area Historical Society at a cost of \$20 each for Historical Society members and \$25 each for non-members. Sales tax is included in the purchase price.

A registration form for the July 8 and July 10 premieres can be found on the Historical Society's website at mtgretnahistory.org. The same form can be used for ordering a copy of the documentary DVD. Copies of the DVD will also be sold at the two premiere showings in July.

Environmental Kids' Club Set for July 9, July 23



Like trees? How about bugs?

Elementary-aged children (and their parents) who live in the area and those visiting Mt. Gretna are invited to participate in two environmental-education programs: "Up Close and Personal—Trees" and "Up Close and Personal—Bugs."

Activities will start at 10 a.m. at the Playground.

Saturday, July 9 - Up Close and Personal—Trees

Leaves are the most common identifying trait of a tree. Join us to learn about different types of leaves and apply your knowledge to identifying various trees in Campmeeting. You'll also learn how to tell the age of a tree and get your own 'tree cookie.'

Saturday, July 23 - Up Close and Personal—Bugs

Wear old sneakers or shoes and get up close and personal with mayfly nymphs, caddis flies, crayfish (if we're lucky) and water pennies (if we are really lucky). These aquatic insects (bugs that live in streams) help tell us how healthy our streams are. We'll be playing in water, so expect to get wet!

These activities are free, but children must be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult.

Library Frequently Asked Questions

This year there seems to be a heightened interest in the Mt. Gretna Community Library and the following questions and answers are provided.

1. What is the relationship between the MGCA and the library?
The library rents the building it occupies from the MGCA, therefore the relationship is a tenant-office landlord.
2. Who operates the library?
The library is operated by an independent board.
3. How is the library funded?
For tax purposes, the library operates under the Arts Council and is funded by modest donations and personal funds.
4. How do I get a key?
For the safety of all involved keys are not uniformly given out.
5. Why do books get thrown away?
The library is a dynamic entity with the committee spending many hours through the year reviewing selections with last year's best seller being this year's special. Donated books are evaluated with some resulting from a clean out of a cottage smelling musty. If books are not needed, they are made available for the community through a variety of avenues or shared with a local animal rescue organization and the ones smelling musty are thrown away.
6. Can I volunteer?
As the operating hours are dependent on volunteers, volunteers are welcomed but we find the library operates as it should with adult volunteers only.
7. What are the operating hours?
They are posted by the magazine rack depending on volunteers and their vacations.

2016 Bible Festival Notes

For the 124th time, Campmeeting activity will permeate Gretna's wooded hillside during the months of June, July, and August. The current version, now called Bible Festival rather than Campmeeting, provides music and preaching just as the original "camp" did in 1892. It is nevertheless quite different, being spread out over thirteen weeks instead of concentrated in nine or ten days of nearly nonstop worship services. There is considerably more variety in today's programs; in fact, there is really something for everyone, beginning with the newest innovation, the Tabernacle Ecumenical Program, presented on the four Friday evenings of June, when visiting pastors from four different local congregations bring their own worship style to the Tabernacle. The general public is cordially invited to attend any or all of these services.

The music programs, ranges from symphonic band (New Holland, June 26) to prize winning chorale (Susquehanna, August 21), from gospel (Keystone Quartet, August 10) to big band (Dave Stahl, August 14). The King's Brass, which made such a hit a few years ago, is back on July 10. The Massed Choir concert, a summer highlight ever since 1959, this year will feature composer-director-pianist Patti Drennan leading the 175 voices of the volunteer choir on July 31.

There will be preaching (Rev. Louis Butcher and the Bright Side choir on July 24) and teaching (about Muslim/Christian relationships) by Jonathan Bornman on July 3. Pastor emeritus Dave Allen, from Calvary Church, Lancaster, will be here on July 17. And mixed in will be the annual handbell festival on August 6 which brings Bill Payne, retired director of music at Bucknell University to the Tabernacle. It all concludes, as it has for at least the last fifteen years, with our QuintEssentially Brass friends, their delightful personalities and sparkling musicianship.

Interested In Throwing Quoits?

Efforts are underway to compile a list of all Mt. Gretna residents and visitors who are interested in throwing quoits at the quoit beds located on Rt. 117 in the Campmeeting. The quoit beds are housed under the pavilion along Rt. 117 that many people have probably mistaken in recent years for a trolley or bus stop. Quoits are round in shape. Throwing quoits is similar to the game of horseshoes.

Quoits were a popular activity in the Campmeeting in the early decades of the twentieth century through World War II and were “thrown” or “pitched” in quoit bed areas in a number of locations throughout the Campmeeting. The quoit beds along Rt. 117 are the only ones remaining in Mt. Gretna.

Mt. Gretna Area Historical Society Hosts Antiques Appraisal Fair

Clocks, jewelry, rockers, quilts and coins—these were among the dozens of items that residents of Mt. Gretna and the surrounding communities recently brought for the second annual Antiques Appraisal Fair hosted by the Mt. Gretna Area Historical Society.

A quilt, owned by two area residents, was appraised with an estimated value of \$8,000—the highest appraisal of this year's event.

Attendees at the event, which served as a fundraiser for the Historical Society, were provided with appraisals by Terry Breidenstine, owner of All County Jewelry, Coins & Antiques in Lebanon, and Robert Swartz, owner of RLS Antiques in Cornwall. SWC Wealth Management of Mt. Gretna served as the sponsor for the event.

Quiet Hours and Leaf-Blowers

While the summer quiet hours are almost here (July 15 – August 31), please remember the Campmeeting maintains year-round quiet hours all day Sunday, and from 11 pm to 7 am the rest of the week.

From our Rules & Regulations: “High decibel power tools, such as saws and leaf blowers, and manual work, such as framing and roofing, are prohibited. Moderate noise created by indoor work is acceptable. Painting and landscaping are permitted. During the noise abatement period, permitted work must be confined to the hours between 8:30 AM and 4:30 PM Monday through Saturday. An exception shall be made for the Superintendent of Grounds.”

Emergency work approvals may be requested through the MGCA office. Thanks!

From the desk of the Superintendent of Grounds...

Campmeeting is now in summer mode and here are a few reminders for the season.

1. Please clean up after your dog and remind others to do the same; a lack of clean-up is a real issue.
2. The church parking lot is not Campmeeting property. It is church property. Be attentive to posted times for church related activities; church

parishioners have priority over Campmeeting residents.

If you have a contractor working on your cottage, they may not park trailers or work vehicles in this lot overnight or on weekends without church permission.

3. Trash pickup is Monday. Place trash out for pickup Sunday evening or Monday morning. Too often folks place trash out days early and our feral cat population, possum, or raccoon has a way of spreading the trash.

Any trash receptacle placed out on Monday should be collected by owner by that afternoon. There are too many receptacles that sit in the street for an entire week. Put your address on the can if you are not home so it can be returned to your cottage by a neighbor.

If your trash was missed, call TNT Sanitation directly at 717.866.2322. Someone will be sent to get it.

4. Community trash receptacles (trash cans/bins) are not for disposal of large household items.

5. Obey our street signs; slow down, stop at red octagon shaped signs, and one way streets only have one direction.

6. Quiet time starts July 15. It is the homeowner's responsibility to tell contractors working for you about Campmeeting policy.

Other news:

The Campmeeting will be having some minor paving work done in June on walking paths and curbing. A major project will begin after Labor Day. Buildings & Grounds is engaged in a 3-5 year project to reclaim our community parks and gardens from weeds and neglect. Two projects completed this spring can be enjoyed on the corner of Markwood Ave and Sixth Street and adjacent to the playground area.

Green pick-up will continue through the summer as necessary on Monday mornings.

Recycling

The MGCA Office regularly receives inquiries about what items can be recycled. Currently the following items are collected by TNT Sanitation.

- Aluminum cans
- Steel and Bi-Metallic cans
- Clear and Colored Glass
- #1 and #2 plastic bottles (see the recycling triangle on the bottom of the bottle)
- Newsprint, phone books, magazines, and junk mail.

The following items ***cannot*** be collected by TNT.

- Cookware
- Pottery
- Any type of glass that is not a bottle or jar, for example, windows
- Wire hangers
- Yogurt, coolwhip, deli, or margarine containers
- Pill bottles
- Motor oil containers

Electronic devices are prohibited from the Lebanon County landfill and TNT is not allowed to take electronic devices with the trash. These must be taken to a DEP approved recycling center.

Building Permits Required for...

Are you considering an addition to your cottage, remodeling or renovating, altering the exterior boundaries of an existing structure, adding a porch/deck, adding a driveway/parking area, adding a fence, upgrading water or sewer

lines, adding or reconstructing a chimney or removing a tree (or any other items listed in the MGCA Rules and Regulations)?

If so, Campmeeting members should be advised that a MGCA Building Permit Application **MUST** be submitted to the MGCA Board of Managers for approval as delineated in the most recent Rules & Regulations (R&R) handbook and/or as required by the Lebanon County Planning Department (LCPD) and West Cornwall Township (WCT).

Additional information is available in the new "MGCA Building Permit Information" Sheet that is available on the MGCA website, MtGretnaCampmeeting.com, or from the office at 717-964-2074.

The Board of Managers recommends that before starting any type of construction work on their property, Campmeeting members should read the Rules & Regulations handbook or discuss the project with a member of the Buildings & Grounds Committee. Also, in order to know **EXACTLY** where your property lines are located according to your deed, you may be required to have your property surveyed (as per LCPD).

Remember to tell your contractor 'Quiet Season' in Campmeeting is July 15 through and including August 31 (read R&R #17).

In addition, speeding within the grounds (Rule #6 in the Rules & Regulations booklet) is punishable by a \$100 fine.

If you observe a neighbor speeding, please say something to them. If you do not know the driver of the car, please get the license number and submit it to the MGCA office for the Board of Managers to follow up on the rule violation.
